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Introduction

1.1 Introduction

1.1.1 Persons with Disabilities (Equal Opportunities, Protection of Rights and Full Participation) Act, 1995 (the Act) was enacted to give effect to the Proclamation on the Full Participation and Equality of the People with Disabilities in the Asian and Pacific Region adopted in the meeting convened by the Economic and Social Commission for Asia and Pacific held from 1st to 5th December, 1992. The Act casts certain obligations on the Central Government, State Governments and the local authorities to take special measures for prevention and early detection of disabilities, education, employment, provision of aids and appliances, access to public places, transport, etc. to persons with disabilities. It also has provisions for research and manpower development, social security, mechanism for redressal of grievances and monitoring of utilization of funds. The provisions contained in the Act are monitored by Central Co-ordination Committee and the Central Executive Committee at the Centre level. Similar provision under the Act exists for an arrangement in the State through the

State Co-ordination Committees/State Executive Committees.

1.2 Person with Disability and the Disabilities:

As per the Act, a "person with disability" means a person suffering from not less than 40% of any disability as certified by a medical authority. "Disability" as defined in Section 2 (i) of the Act means – (i) blindness (ii) low vision (iii) leprosy cured (iv) hearing impairment (v) locomotor disability (vi) mental retardation (vii) mental illness. The definitions of various disabilities are as follows:

- (i) Blindness- total absence of sight or visual acuity not exceeding 6/60 or 20/200 (snellen) in the better eye with correcting lenses; or limitation of the field of vision subtending an angle of 20 degree or worse;
- (ii) Low vision- person with impairment of visual functioning even after treatment of standard refractive correction but who uses or is potentially capable of using vision for the planning or execution of a task with appropriate assistive device;
- (iii) Leprosy cured- any person who has been cured of leprosy but is suffering from loss of sensation in hands or feet as well

as loss of sensation and paresis in the eye and eye-lid but with no manifest deformity, manifest deformity and paresis but having sufficient mobility in their hands and feet to enable them to engage in normal economic activity, extreme physical deformity as well as advanced age which prevents him from undertaking any gainful occupation and the expression "leprosy cured" shall be construed accordingly;

- **(iv)** Hearing impaired- loss of sixty decibels or more in the better ear in the conversational range of frequencies;
- (v) Locomotor disability- disability of bones, joints or muscles leading to substantial restriction of the movement of the limbs or any form of cerebral palsy;
- (vi) Mental Retardation- a condition of arrested or incomplete development of mind of a person which is specially characterised by subnormality of intelligence;
- (vii) Mental illness- any mental disorder other than mental retardation.

The National Trust for the Welfare of Persons with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation and Multiple Disabilities Act, 1999 provides for three more disabilities namely autism, cerebal palsy, and multiple disabilities. Cerebral Palsy is covered under locomotor disability and multiple disabilities are a combination of two or more disabilities. Though autism has not been defined as a separate category of disability in the Persons with Disabilities Act, 1995, although the definition of mental illness encompasses in it the disabilities with mental disorder other than mental retardation.

1.3 Population of Persons with Disabilities

As per census 2011, the population of persons with various disabilities is 268.10 Lakhs. This is the first time when broad categories of disabilities were included during enumeration. A total of eight types of disabilities were included in 2011 Census against the earlier five. The disability wise population is as under:

Historical Perspective:

- ☐ The question on disability was canvassed in all the Censuses since 1872 to 1931.
- ☐ The question on disability was not canvassed in the Censuses from 1941 to 1971.
- ☐ In Census 1981, data on only three types of disabilities was collected.
- ☐ The question on disabilities was dropped in Census 1991.
- ☐ In Census 2001, the question was again included and data on five types of disabilities was collected.

☐ Now, in Census 2011 data on eight types of disabilities was collected.

Definitional Changes:

Several definitional changes were made out between Census 2001 to 2011. Disbaility-wise changes made are as under:

- ☐ In seeing: One-eyed persons were treated as disabled at Census 2001. At the Census 2011, such persons have not been treated as disabled in seeing. At the Census 2011 enumerators were asked to apply a simple test to ascertain blurred vision. At Census 2001 no such instructions were given.
- □ In hearing: Persons using hearing aid have been treated as disabled at Census 2011. They were not treated as disabled at the Census 2001. Persons having problem in hearing through one ear although the other ear is functioning normally was considered having hearing disability in Census 2001. But in Census 2011, such persons were not considered as disabled.
- ☐ In speech: Definition was made clearer in Census 2011 to record persons with speech disability. For instance, "persons who speak in single words and are not able to speak in sentences" was specifically mentioned to be treated as disabled.
- ☐ **In movement:** Specific mention of the following was made in the definition for Census 2011:
 - Paralytic persons
 - Those who crawl
 - Those who are able to walk with the help of aid
 - Have acute and permanent problems of joints/muscles

- Have stiffness or tightness in movement or have loose, involuntary movements or tremours of the body or have fragile bones
- Have difficulty balancing and coordinating body movement
- Have loss of sensation in body due to paralysis, leprosy etc.
- Have deformity of body like hunchback or are dwarf.
- ☐ Mental Retardation: New category introduced at Census 2011. Mental Retardation was covered under the category of mental disability at Census 2001.
- ☐ Mental illness: New category introduced at Census 2011. Mental Illness was covered under the category of mental disability at Census 2001.
- 2011 to ensure complete coverage. This option enabled respondents to report those disabilities, which are not listed in the question. In such cases, where informant was not sure about the type of disability this option of reporting disability as 'Any Other' was available to her/him.
- ☐ **Multiple Disabilities:** New category introduced at Census 2011. The question had been designed to record as many as three types of disabilities from which the individual was reported to be suffering.

1.4 Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities (CCPD) and Commissioners for Persons with Disabilities (SCDs)

The Act provides for appointment of a Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities at the Centre and a Commissioner in each State for taking steps to safeguard the rights of persons with disabilities (PwDs) and monitor the implementation of the Act. While the Chief Commissioner is appointed by the Central Government under Section 57 (1) of the Act, the Commissioners in the States are appointed by the respective State Governments under the provisions of Section 60 (1) of the Act.

1.5 Office of the Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities (CCPD):

Office of the Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities came into existence with the appointment of the first Chief Commissioner on 01.09.1998. The organization chart of the Office of CCPD is at **Appendix - X**.

1.6 Functions of the CCPD

- **1.6.1** Under Section 58 The Chief Commissioner shall
 - (a) coordinate the work of the Commissioners;
 - **(b)** monitor the utilization of funds disbursed by the Central Government;
 - (c) take steps to safeguard the rights and facilities made available to persons with disabilities;
 - (d) submit reports to the Central Government on the implementation of the Act at such intervals as that Government may prescribe.
- **1.6.2** Section 59 Without prejudice to the provisions of Section 58, the Chief Commissioner may of his own motion or on the

- application of any aggrieved person or otherwise look into complaints with respect to matters relating to –
- (a) deprivation of rights of persons with disabilities;
- (b) non-implementation of laws, rules, byelaws, regulations, executive orders, guidelines or instructions made or issued by the appropriate Governments and the local authorities for the welfare and protection of rights of persons with disabilities, and take up the matter with the appropriate authorities.

1.7 Functions of the Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities (SCD)

- **1.7.1** Under Section 61 The Commissioners within the State shall
 - (a) coordinate with the departments of the State Government for the programmes and schemes for the benefit of persons with disabilities;
 - (b) monitor the utilization of funds disbursed by the State Government;
 - (c) take steps to safeguard the rights and facilities made available to persons with disabilities;
 - (d) submit reports to the State Government on the implementation of the Act at such intervals as that Government may prescribe and forward a copy thereof to the Chief Commissioner.
- **1.7.2** Section 62 Without prejudice to the provisions of Section 61, the Commissioner may of his own motion or on the applica-

- tion of any aggrieved person or otherwise look into complaints with respect to matters relating to –
- (a) deprivation of rights of persons with disabilities;
- (b) non-implementation of laws, rules, byelaws, regulations, executive orders, guidelines or instructions made or issued by the appropriate Governments and the local authorities for the welfare and protection of rights of persons with disabilities, and take up the matter with the appropriate authorities.

1.8 Powers of CCPD & SCDs

The Chief Commissioner and the State Commissioners for Persons with Disabilities have been given certain powers of the Civil Court under Section 63 of the Act to perform their functions. These are given below:-

Section 63. (1) – The Chief Commissioner and the Commissioners shall, for the purpose of discharging their functions under this Act, have the same powers as are vested in a court under the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908 while trying a suit, in respect of the following matters, namely-

- (a) summoning and enforcing the attendance of witnesses;
- (b) requiring the discovery and production of any document;
- (c) requisitioning any public record or copy thereof from any court or office;
- (d) receiving evidence on affidavits; and
- (e) issuing commissions for the examination of witnesses or documents;

(2) Every proceeding before the Chief Commissioner and Commissioners shall be a judicial proceeding within the meaning of Section 193 and 228 of the Indian Penal Code and the Chief Commissioner, the Commissioner, the competent authority, shall be deemed to be a civil court for the purposes of section 195 and Chapter XXVI of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973.

1.9 Appointment of State Commissioners for Persons with Disabilities (SCDs)

While the Government of Assam, Delhi, Gujarat, Haryana, Karnataka, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Manipur, Mizoram, Nagaland, Odisha, Tamil Nadu and West Bengal had appointed full time Commissioners, the work of the State Commissioner had been assigned as additional charge to another officer during the reporting year in other States/UTs. Chief Commissioner takes up with the concerned State Government at the highest level for appointment of a full time Commissioner regularly. Some of the States, for various reasons, such as small size of the State, have indicated the reason why the charge of Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities is given to another officer.

1.10 Brief on the Areas of Intervention by the O/o CCPD

1.10.1 The Office of CCPD has become a focal point for seeking justice to persons with disabilities. A large number of persons with disabilities approach this office whenever they are deprived of their rights by any Govt. body, not only for matters relating to the Central Government but also to various State Governments and local authorities as also private entities.

- 1.10.2 The Office takes suo-motu notices of non-implementation of various provisions of the Act such as reservation in employment, admissions, instances of discrimination against PwDs reported in the press, media in appropriate portrayal of disability by electronic media and takes up with the concerned authorities. Such proactive initiatives have not only protected the rights of PwDs but also have sensitized all the stakeholders and created awareness about the issues concerning PwDs.
- 1.10.3 The Office of CCPD inspects the organizations that are given grant-in-aid by Government of India under various schemes like ADIP, DDRS, etc. with a view to monitor the utilization of funds. Physical verification of the beneficiaries is ensured in the process.
- 1.10.4 One of the major functions of the Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities is to co-ordinate the work of the Commissioners for Persons with Disabilities in the States/UTs. The State Commissioners co-ordinate with the concerned departments of the State Governments in implementation of the programmes and schemes for the benefit of PwDs. Office of

CCPD gathers information about the progress of implementation of various schemes, programmes and the provisions of the Act by different departments of State Governments through meetings and interactions with the SCDs.

- 1.10.5 Office of CCPD organizes national meeting of the Commissioners annually for coordination of the work of Commissioners and reviewing the implementation of Persons with Disabilities Act, 1995. State Commissioners provide an overview of their work, the initiatives taken by them and achievements of various departments of the State Government in the disability sector during the year. Commissioners themselves get an opportunity to exchange information and views during the meeting. It also helps them in contributing effectively in better implementation of the Act and Schemes. The best practices in different States/UTs are circulated in the meetings for replication by others.
- **1.10.6** The Office of CCPD also pursued Central Ministries/Departments to add a

separate chapter on disability in their annual reports. As a result of its persistent efforts, 20 Ministries / Departments, viz., Ministries of Civil Aviation, Commerce and Industry, Information & Broadcasting, Human Resource Development, Mines, Minority Affairs, Power, Road Transport & Highways, Rural Development, Tribal Affairs, Tourism, Urban Development, Water Resources, Ganga Development and River Rejuvenation and Departments of Atomic Energy, Posts, Telecommunication, Culture, Consumer Affairs, Fertililizer, AYUSH have added separate chapter on persons with disabilities in their Annual Reports. Until 2013-14, 19 Ministries/ Departments had added separate chapter in their annual reports.

1.10.7 The Office of CCPD took initiative to audit public places such as Government office buildings, hospitals, stadia, market places, railway stations, airports, bus stops, religious places, etc. for their accessibility to PwDs and ensures that the required modifications are carried out.

2

Action Plan and Initiatives

2.1 Action Plan and Initiatives

2.1.1 The Office of the Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities drew up the under-mentioned Action Plan for the year

2014-15 keeping in view the available resources. The action plan indicates broad areas of activities that were proposed to be focused upon during the year and the action taken thereon:

- 2.1.2 Over the years, awareness about the provisions of the PwD Act and the entitlements of persons with disabilities under various schemes and programs of the government and local authorities has increased among persons with disabilities, their parents, families, civil society, organizations working in the disability sector as also among government officials. Office of the Chief Commissioner has played a significant role in creating such awareness among the stakeholders across the country through various methods. Consequently, the demands on the limited resources of the Office of the CCPD have increased manifold in terms of formal as well as informal complaints, representations, seeking information, etc. Also interaction between CCPD and various stakeholders, participation Committees on disability issues in Government and corporate/non-government sector has increased.
- **2.1.3** The Office of the CCPD has tried to perform all its statutory functions within the

- limited resources. In the year 1998, the office was sanctioned 02 Deputy Chief Commissioners, 02 Desk Officers, 13 Secretarial/Ministerial staff, 01 Driver and 03 Group 'D' staff to assist the Chief Commissioner. There has not been any increase in the number of officers and staff during the last 17 years, though the work has increased manifold. Consequently, very limited work could be undertaken on monitoring of utilization of funds disbursed by the Central Government, holding of mobile courts and accessibility checks (Access audits). The office was allocated Rs. 2.31 Crore under the 'Non-Plan Head' for the year 2014-15.
- 2.1.4 The need for strengthening the Office of CCPD urgently has been emphasized for quite some time. Additional human and other resources are essential to enable the Office to perform its statutory functions and meet the expectations of persons with disabilities in the country. The Commissioners for persons with disabilities in the States also need to be strengthened by

providing them adequate human and other resources.

2.2 Major Activities Undertaken by the Office of CCPD

2.2.1 Co-ordination of the work of Commissioners and review of implementation of the PwD Act:

The 13th Annual meeting of the State Commissioners was held on 5th & 6th July, 2014 to review the status of implementation of the Persons with Disabilities Act in the States/UTs in the year 2013-14.

2.2.2. State visits of Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities reviewing the status of the implementation of the Act:

CCPD reviewed the status of implementation of the Act in Chhattisgarh, Kerala, Maharashtra & Mizoram. The format for review includes ascertaining the status in a meeting with the Commissioner and the Secretary/Principal Secretary and other officers of the Department of Social Welfare. Thereafter, the status was reviewed in respect of each in a joint meeting. CCPD then met the Chief Secretary or in some cases the Chief Minister to discuss important issues that involve inter-department coordination and intervention at their levels so that the issues got the attention at the highest level. The response was very positive and some important issues were resolved in many States. Thereafter CCPD along with the SCD interacted with the persons with disabilities, their

parents, care givers and the NGOs in the disability sector followed by a press meet. This format of interaction has proved very effective in creation of awareness, dissemination of information about the status of implementation and appropriate action for better implementation by concerned authorities.

CCPD visited Chhattisgarh on 29th - 30th May, 2014, Kerala on 17th July, 2014, Maharshtra on 31st October, 2014 and Mizoram on 20th May, 2014. More review could not be conducted due to non-availability of full time Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities after December, 2014.

2.2.3 Monitoring utilization of funds:

The Office of CCPD carried out physical verification of beneficiaries of 02 organizations in the State of Uttar Pradesh, 01 organisation in Bihar, 01 organisation in Madhya Pradesh and 01 Organisation in Maharashtra that received grant-in-aid from Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment under ADIP/DDRS for monitoring utilization of the funds. The Reports of the Monitoring Team were sent to the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment for appropriate action.

2.2.4 Barrier-free Environment

Creation of barrier-free environment has been one of the important focus areas of the Office of CCPD since long. Regular monitoring of various facilities for their accessibility to persons with disabilities and access audit of public places have not only contributed to such places being made accessible, but also created considerable awareness among various service providers and helped in sensitizing towards the equality of rights and participation of persons with disabilities. During the reporting year, O/o of CCPD conducted access audits of Krishna Nagar Post Office; Delhi Haat, Janak Puri and Iskcon Temple, East of Kailash, New Delhi and recommended necessary modifications to the concerned authorities.

2.2.5 Our engagement with autonomous bodies like NHRC, UGC etc.

CCPD & DCC were also a member of various Committees constituted by autonomous bodies like NHRC, UGC etc. and engaged with institutions like AIIs, Training Institutions, etc. for augmenting capacities of stakeholders of strategic importance. Inputs relating to disability matters were provided to them while serving on committees for the benefit of persons with disabilities.

2.2.6 Our contribution to various Government Committees

The Office of CCPD has contributed in following Government Committees on different policy related issues:

(a) Expert Committee on Review and Revise rules, Schemes and provisions concerning disabled students and teachers

- (b) Committee to finalise the draft guidelines on norms and standards for barrier free environment for persons with disabilities
- (c) Committee for Monitoring effective implementation of Reservation Policy for PwDs in Employment and Admission in the University/Colleges
- (d) Meeting of National Monitoring Committee for education of SC, ST and PwDs under Chairmainship of Hon'ble Minister for Human Resources Development

2.2.7 Implementation of Section 33 in the Office of Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities

As per the recruitment rules of the Office of Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities, the posts in the office are to be filled by deputation/contract. Even though there is no provision for reservation for persons with disabilities (PwDs) in the vacancies filled by deputation/contract, the office makes all efforts to appoint PwDs and has one PwD at present. - 2.2.8 Some of the outcomes of the initiatives of the Office of CCPD and orders issued by various authorities:
 - i) DOPT vide OM dated 06.06.2014, issued guidelines for expempting those Government servants from routine exercise of transfer/rotational transfer subject to administrative constraints who are also a main caregiver of a disabled child.
 - ii) OM dated 31.03.2014 issued for providing certain facilities to persons with disabilities in Govt services like iidentification of jobs, post recruitment and pre-promotion training, assistive devices, free accessibility, preference in transfer/posting, special casual leave, etc.
 - iii) OM dated 25.02.2015 issued for Amendment to Central Civil Service (Leave) Rules, 1972 for making it convenient with the provisions contained in Section 47 of Persons with Disabilities Act, 1995.

- iv) OM dated 29.06.2015 issued for granting of age concession to the Persons with Disabilities suffering from (a) blindness or low vision, (b) hearing impairment and (c) locomotor disability or cerebral palsy for direct recruitment to civil posts/services under the Central Government.
- v) At the instance of this office, JNU changed the nomenclature for the programme of disability affairs from differently abled studies program to persons with disabilities studies program.
- vi) Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment has blacklisted the NGO Chitragupta Shikshan Sansthan, Varanasi based on report submitted by the Office of CCPD as regards to monitoring of utilization of funds under ADIP.

Status of Implementation of the PWD Act by Central Ministries/Departments

The Office of Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities has been constantly pursuing with Central Ministries and Departments for implementation of provisions of PwD Act by them and for adding separate chapter in their respective Annual Reports highlighting the actions taken for the benefit of persons with disabilities. In compliance, 20 Ministries / Departments, viz., Ministries of Civil Aviation, Commerce and Industry, Information & Broadcasting, Human Resource Development, Mines, Minority Affairs, Power, Road Transport & Highways, Rural Development, Tribal Affairs, Tourism, Urban Development, Water Resources, Ganga Development and River Rejuvenation and Departments of Atomic Energy, Posts, Telecommunication, Culture, Consumer Affairs, Fertiliser, AYUSH have added separate chapter on persons with disabilities in their Annual Reports.

The status of implementation of major provisions of the Act and facilities being extended to PwDs by Central Ministries & Departments are highlighted below:-

3.1 Minsitry of Chemical and Fertilisers Department of Fertilisers

Various PSUs working under the Department are providing facilities to employ-

ees with disabilities working under them, which are as under:

- ☐ Brahmaputra Valley Fertiliser Corporation Limited (BVFCL): Rs 2400/- is provided as allowance per year to the person with disabilities working in the organisation.
- Rashtriya Chemicals & Fertilisers Ltd (RCF): Posts for recruitment of PwDs have identified in Group A, C & D as RCF does not making recruitment in Group B. Separate Liaison Officer has been appointed for ensuring implementation of Persons with Disabilities Act, 1995. Counselling session of disabled employees and their families are organized. Workshop of 3 days duration has conducted on "Empowerment of Persons with Different Abilities". Preference of allotment of staff quarters at ground level is given. Ramps have built at main buildings.
- ☐ The Fertilisers and Chemicals Travancore Ltd (FACT): 3% reservation to PwDs in the recruitment has given. Conveyance allowance @ 5 % of basic pay subject to maximum of Rs 100/- per month is being given to PwD employees. Company pro-

vided ramps at many places in their campus for easy movement of PwD employees. Financial assistance for purchase of artificial limbs, crutches, special shoes etc is provide from "Employees Welfare Fund" to deserving employees.

- ☐ Madras Fertilisers Ltd: Employees with disabilities are extending special casual leave for 4 days in a calendar year.
- □ National Fertilisers Ltd (NFL): All PwDs are posted at ground floor of the building and at convenient places in order to provide them easy accessibility to their work of place and they have been assigned the work according to their capacity. Benefits related to age relaxation, fee exemption, travelling allowances are being given as per rules.

3.2 Minsitry of Communications & IT

3.2.1 Department of Posts

Various facilities are providind to PwDs as mentioned hereunder:

- □ 3% reservation is being given to persons with disabilities.
- ☐ OH postal employees are eligible for following financial assistance:
 - Reimbursement of amount spent on purchase of Mechanized tricycle, subject to a limit of Rs 20,000/-
 - Claim of Rs 15,000/- or 50% of the cost of motorized tricycle whichever is less, from the Circle Welfare Fund. Furthermore, if employee applies for scooter advance, his or her case is considered on sympathetic basis.

- Actual 2nd class railway fare from the place of duty to the artificial limb centre and back is also reimbursable from welfare fund for provision of artificial limbs, as such reimbursement is not admissible from any other source.
- ☐ Blind literature packets weighing upto 7 Kg are transmitted free by the Department of Posts.
- ☐ Under the Educational Scheme of the Department of Posts, children with disabilities of postal employees drawing pay upto Rs 29790/- per month are eligible to get annual scholarships.
- ☐ Transport charges and Hostel/Mess subsidies are allowed to disabled children of postal employees studying from 1st to 12th standard at the rate of Rs 100/- per month in 'A' class cities and @ Rs 80/- per month in 'B' class cities.

3.2.2 Department of Telecommunications Centre for Development of Telematic (C-DOT)

- ☐ DoT follows guidelines issued by Government of India with respect to reservations in jobs for persons with disabilities.
- ☐ The C-DoT Campus at Delhi has been constructed in such a manner so as to ensure barrier free environment for the persons with disabilities. The main entrance/exit can be approached through a ramp together with stepped entry. Even elevators connecting the various working areas have been installed in a way to facilitate persons with disabilities to move around freely from one wing to another.

Bharat Sanchar Nigam Limited (BSNL)

Visually imapired persons are entitled for following concessions on their telephone:

Rental rebate - 50 % of normal rental **Advance rental -** 50 % of the normal advance rental and bi-monthly rental as applicable to normal subscriber.

Mahanagar Telephone Nigam Limited (MTNL)

Mahanagar Telephone Nigam Limited has always endeavoured towards upliftment of social status of PwDs by innovating and executing action plans falling under its realm. As on 31.12.2014, 0.465 % of total manpower are persons with disabilities in MTNL.

Below mentioned steps have been taken by MTNL in fulfilling its social responsibility:

- ☐ The provisions of reservation as per GOI Rules have been made in recruitment of officers in various streams.
- ☐ In order to provide them with livelihood, physically challenged people are allotted PCOs on priority basis and also the commission made to them is 22% as against 20% for others.
- ☐ Further, to avoid delay in allotment of PCOs, mobile booths are being provided to them based on CDMA/GSM technology.

ITI Limited

ITI Limited, being a socially conscious Public Sector Undertaking, has from its inception been committed to the concept of employees' welfare. Due importance is given to the welfare of persons with disabilities. The facilities being provided to persons with disabilities are as follows:

- ☐ Physically challenged employees who are residing in the township are given special allowance at the rate of 5% of the basic pay subject to maximum of Rs.75/- per month.
- ☐ Those employees who are not residing in the Company's township but are utilizing Company's transport for commuting between residence and factory are given special allowance at the rate of 5% of basic pay subject to maximum of Rs.100/-per month.
- ☐ Physically challenged employees are permitted 10 minutes grace time to punch in and out at the commencement and closure of the shift respectively. They are allotted quarters on "Out of Turn" basis.
- ☐ As per the Government directive, ITI has been maintaining 3% (1% for OH, 1% for VH and 1% for HH) reservation for physically challenged in recruitment and the reservation in promotion has also been maintained wherever applicable.
- ☐ In case of physically challenged, the company has been relaxing 10 years in age in case of recruitment for Group C and D posts and 5 years in case of Group A and B posts. In case of candidates belonging to SC/ST/OBC, among them an additional relaxation in age by 5 years for SC/ST and 3 years for OBC is given for posts in Group A and B.

3.4 Ministry of Culture

- ☐ Gandhi Summer Camp was organized for children with disabilities during 23-28 June, 2014. The programme aimed towards build self-esteem of persons with disabilities so that they can negotiate any challenges in their lives like any other person.
- ☐ World Disabled Day celebrated under the tilte 'Maitri Mahotsava'. A sensitization programme for school children from different schools were sensitized and made aware about how to interact with disabled persons.
- ☐ A four day Terracotta workshop entitled Mitti ke Dost specially meant for the disabled children was organized on 28 November, 2014. During the workshop the children expressed their creativity through the medium of clay.

☐ A special exhibition entitled Ek Prarthana containing posters on disability with poems written by noted poet and writer Gulzar was mounted on 02 December, 2014 at Veethi Sankul.

3.5 Ministry of External Affairs

The Ministry is fully committed to providing adequate opportunities to the persons with disabilities, for ensuring their appropriate representation amongst its personnel. Towards achieving this goal, the Ministry has identified suitable positions for those with various disabilities as prescribed under the relevant Government of India Rules. Seven candidates have so far joined the Indian Foreign Service.

3.6 Ministry of Health & Family Welfare Department of Health & Family Welfare

- ☐ Three National programmes are running for persons with disabilities:
- National Programme for Control of Blindness
- National Programme for Prevention and Control of Deafness
- National Programme for Mental Health

3.7 Ministry of Human Resource Development

For the educational development of persons with disabilities (PwDs), Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan (SSA) has adopted a more expansive and a broad-based understanding of the concept of inclusion, wherein a multi-option model of educating Children with Special Need (CWSN) is being implemented. The objective of embracing this model is to bring more CWSN under the umbrella of SSA. 27.91 lakh CWSN have been identified till now. Similarly, the enrollment of CWSN has gone up to 25.03 lakh CWSN (89.69%). More CWSN are likely to be covered this year through various interventions and strategies. Through home-based education, SSA has been able to cover 1.28 lakh CWSN. 36 States/ UTs have appointed 21056 resource persons. 764 NGOs (31 states) are currently involved in the IE programme under SSA. 30.76 lakh CWSN (79.36% of the CWSN requiring aids and appliances) under SSA have been provided assistive devices through various modes. 82.33% schools have been made barrier-free and very focused efforts are being made by all the States to cover more schools in a phased manner. Another recent initiative of SSA States has been of providing disabled friendly toilets. Thus far in SSA, 14.82% schools have been provided disabled friendly toilets.

Inclusive Education for Disabled at Secondary Stage(IEDSS): Launched in 2009-

10 replacing the earlier scheme of Integrated Education for Disabled Children (IEDC). The aim of the Scheme is to enable all students with disabilities, after completing eight years of elementary schooling, to pursue further four years of secondary schooling (classes IX to XII) in an inclusive and enabling environment. The PAB has aaproved 226832 CWSN to be covered under IEDSS. Central Assistance of Rs 193.33 Crores has also granted to States/UTs to implement the various interventions of IEDSS.

3.8 Ministry of Home

- ☐ There are 14 VH, 01 HH and 10 OH persons working in the Ministry.
- On account of the nature of work, all categories of posts of "combatant personnel" of the Central Armed Forces are exempted from Section 33 of the Persons with Disabilities (Equal Opportunities, Protection of Rights and Full Participation) Act, 1995.

3.9 Ministry of Mines

- Section 33 of the Persons with Disabilities Act, 1995 is implemented.
- ☐ NALCO organizes All India Badminton Tournament for disabled persons every year at their S&P Complex at Angul.

3.10 NITI AAYOG

The Twelfth Plan has proposed several social, educational and employment provisions for the self-reliance of PwDs. The plan has proposed Pre-Matric Scholar-

ships, Post-Matric Scholarships, Free Coaching, Special/Residential schools for students with severe and multiple disabilities in the districts not having Govt. Special schools, Hostels for existing Govt. special schools having no hostels and augmentation of seats in existing hostels of Govt. special schools, support for establishment/modernization/capacity augmentation of Braille press, scholarships for "Top Class" education, Rajiv Gandhi National Fellowship, National Overseas Scholarships, establishment of a college for deaf in each of the five regions of the country and establishment of National Accessible Library. An outlay of Rs. 565.00 crores has made for empowerment of persons with disabilities during 2014-15.

3.11 Ministry of Information and Broadcasting

The following additional provision has been made for ST students with disabilities:

- (a) Reader Allowance for Blind Scholars;
- (b) Provision of transport allowance up to Rs. 160 per month for disabled students, if such student does not reside in the hostel, which is within the premises of educational institution. The disability as per the Persons with Disabilities (Equal Opportunities, Protection of Rights and Full Participation) Act, 1995 is defined as blindness, low-vision, leprosy-cured, hearing impairment, locomotor disability, mental retardation and mental illness;
- **(c)** Escort Allowance of Rs. 160 per month for severely handicapped day scholar students with low extremity disability;
- (d) Special Pay of Rs. 160 per month is admissible to any employee of the hostel willing to extend help to a severely orthopedically handicapped student residing in hostel of an educational insti-

- tution, who may need the assistance of the helper;
- **(e)** Allowance of Rs. 240 per month towards extra coaching to mentally retarded and mentally ill students.

Up-gradation of Merit for ST Students

There is a provision to include 3% disabled ST students wherever possible. Besides the amount of scholarship, student with disabilities are awarded the following assistance:

- (a) Reader allowance of Rs. 150 per month for blind students in class IX to XII;
- (b) Transport allowance of Rs. 100 per month for the disabled students if such a student does not reside in the hostel, which is within the premises of educational institution. The disability as per the said Act is defined as blindness, low-vision, leprosycured, hearing impairment, locomotor disability, mental retardation and mental illness;
- (c) Special pay of Rs. 150 per month is admissible to any employee of the hostel willing to extend help to severely orthopedically handicapped students residing in a hostel managed by the educational or by the State Government/Union Territory Administration who may need the assistance of a helper;
- (d) Escort allowance of Rs. 100 per month for severely handicapped day scholar students with lower extremity disability.

The provisions in (b) to (d) will also apply to leprosy-cured students.

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Rajiv Gandhi National Fellowship for ST Students

Escorts/Reader Assistance @ Rs. 2,000/-p.m. in cases of physically and visually handicapped candidates in provided.

Hostels for ST Girls and Boys

It has been kept in the provisions of the scheme that a few rooms/blocks of the hostels be constructed barrier free and facilities like ramp etc. for the convenience of the ST students with disabilities.

Establishment of Ashram Schools in Tribal Sub Plan Areas

It has been kept in the provisions of the scheme that a few rooms/blocks of the hostels be constructed barrier free and facilities like ramp etc. for the convenience of the ST students with disabilities.

NGO Schemes

The State Governments have been requested to advise NGOs receiving funds under the NGO schemes and under the Scheme of Development of Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Groups (PTGs), to provide 'Barrier-Free Environment' facilities in the residential schools/non-residential schools, hostels, 10 or more bedded hospitals and buildings such as Community Centers, etc. as per the National Policy for Persons with Disabilities, 2006.

4.1.4 Education (Section 26-31):

☐ All the children with special needs are provided free education upto eighteen

- years and no child is denied for admission in Govt./Govt. aided schools.
- ☐ Special teachers are appointed in Govt Schools for conducting part-time classes in respect of CwDs having completed for education upto 5th standard.
- ☐ Part-time classes for providing functional literacy for children upto the age of 16 years and above age group.
- ☐ Open school system and Universities are available for the disabled children to continue their education.
- ☐ 578 CwDs studying in Class Ist to VIIIth and 220 CwDs studying in Class IXth to XIIth were provided scholarships.
- ☐ The disabled children are provided with free of cost books and equipments as per their needs.
- ☐ Barrier free entrance in school colleges, grant of scholarship to CwDs are some of features already undertaken by the Administration.
- ☐ CBSE pattern of syllabus is followed in the schools in the Island.

Directorate of Social Welfare is providing transport/escort allowance to needy children under SSA who avail other mode of conveyance to attend normal schooling.

4.1.5 Employment (Section 32-41):

- ☐ 3% of the posts in Govt Departments are reserved for disabled persons.
- □ Ramps in public buildings, Hospitals, PHCs, other medical care and rehabilitation institution are provided for easy access by the disabled person.

4.1.6 Non-discrimination (Section 44-47):

Ramps in public buildings, hospitals, PHCs & other medical care and rehabilitation institution are provided for easy access to the disabled persons.

4.1.7 Recognition of Institution for PwDs (Section 50-55):

☐ Director, Social Welfare Department has been designated as competent authority for recognition of institutions.

4.1.8 Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities (Section 60):

☐ There is State Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities working in Additional Charge.

4.1.9 Social Security and other scheme (Section 66-68):

☐ 3153 beneficiaries are provided disability allowance @ Rs 2000/- per month.

4.2 ANDHRA PRADESH

4.2.1 Constitution of State Co-ordination Committee (Section 13 -18):

☐ State Co-ordination Committee was reconstituted vide G.O. Ms dated 26.04.2010 under the Chairmanship of Hon'ble Minister for Women, Children & Disabled. The committee is functional.

4.2.2 Constitution of State Executive Committee (Section 19 -21):

☐ State Executive Committee re-constituted vide GO Ms. dated 23.02.2011. The committee is functional.

4.2.3 Prevention and Early Detection of Disabilities (Section 25):

- ☐ Medical & Health Department is conducting various programmes for detecting causes of occurrence of disabilities.
- ☐ Govt. has launched a revitalized school health programme under the name of Jawahar Bala Arogya Raksha programme. It will cover children studying in Govt. & Govt. aided schools in the state by screening each child by Health Team led by PHC Medical Officer.

- ☐ Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan is implemented in vast manner for creation of awareness on health, hygiene and sanitation in State.
- ☐ The State Government is taking pro-active measures for detecting causes of occurrence of disabilities and methods for preventing disabilities through Pulse Polio Immunization Programme; Leprosy eradication programme; National Programme for Control of Blindness; National Mental Health Programme; Supplementary Nutrition Programme; Awareness campaigns on general hygiene, health and sanitation; Integrated Child Development Services; Orientation training to Medical Officers in Primary Health Centres (PHCs); Survey, investigations & research concerning causes of occurrence of disabilities; Promotion methods for prevention of disabilities; Training of staff of PHCs, Creation of awareness through schools, PHCs, Aanganwadi workers, print & electronic media.

4.2.4 Education (Section 26-31):

☐ Children with disabilities are provided free education by the State Government

- through Special Schools, Integrated School system and Inclusive Education system.
- ☐ Instructions have been issued not to deny admission to children with disabilities in normal schools. Children with disabilities are provided education through Inclusive Education under Sarva Siksha Abhiyaan.
- ☐ The Government of Andhra Pradesh is providing 3% reservation of seats in favour of the disabled in all educational institutions i.e., Colleges, Professional Colleges, Universities etc.
- ☐ Total 19 Special Schools i.e. Govt: 06, Govt. Aided (NGOs): 13 are in the State.
- ☐ 19 Special Schools in both Government and Non-Governmental organizations are providing vocational training facilities to the CwDs.
- ☐ The State Government has enhanced the pre-matric scholarships to 9407 CwDs at the total expense of Rs 100 Lakhs during 2014-15 at the following rates whose parents' income is less than Rs. 1 lakh per annum (see Table 4.1).
- ☐ The State Government has enhanced postmatric scholarships to 760 disabled students, reimbursement of tuition fees to

- ☐ Disabled children are provided free of cost special books, equipments uniform etc. to CwDs by the State Government.
- ☐ The curriculum of Diploma in Education has been modified to suit the needs of children with special needs studying in normal schools.

Institute for Mentally Retarded Children, Sector 32, Chandigarh is undertaking various training programs regarding teaching activities of daily life (like toilet training, eating, dressing etc.). Vocational training in candle making, chalk making, cooking and bakery, canning of chairs, book binding, file making cutting and tailoring, Photostat etc., is imparted to enable these mentally challenged persons to become self-reliant.
- ☐ Free Vocational training to persons with disabilities is also being imparted in trades like Computer, Beauty culture, Stenography by the Chandigarh Child & Women Development Corporation.

□ The Chandigarh Administration has established 'Aasha Kiran', a Vocational Training-and-Production Centre for disabled in a double storey building in Sector 46, Chandigarh.

Setting up of Teachers Training Institution (Section 29):

☐ Government Institute for Mentally Retarded, Sector 32, Chandigarh, is imparting orientation training to all Primary and Pre-Primary School Teachers for handling mentally challenged children. Aanganwadi workers are also being trained.

Comprehensive Scheme for Education and to provide Transport Facilities, Scholarships and supply of books (Section 30):

- ☐ The Chandigarh Administration is providing scholarship to the disabled students from Class I onwards in the range of Rs. 250/- to Rs. 500/- depending upon the class of study. During the year, Rs. 3,21,600/- spent for giving scholarships to 96 PwDs.
- ☐ Buildings in 4 colleges and 61 schools have been provided with ramps for the benefit of the persons with disabilities to facilitate their free movement. In all the institutions, efforts are being made to make them barrier free.

4.6.5 Employment (Section 32-41): Identification of Jobs for Persons with Disabilities (Section 32)

☐ The Government of India has already identified jobs which can be held by the persons suffering from disabilities and

instructions have been issued by the Department of Personnel vide letter No.28/22/94/IH(7)-2000/l 1515 dated 13.2.2000 as well as by this Department vide letter No. SW2/1582 dated 25.2.2002 to all Heads of Department to give due reservation of 3% in all these posts.

Reservation in Government Jobs in all Group of Posts (Section 33)

- ☐ Instructions for given 3% reservations to physically handicapped persons have already been issued. Before starting the process for recruitment, Head of Departments must get their rosters checked for the R.E.O. and if there happens to be a backlog for persons with disabilities; the first available posts will be given to persons with disabilities.

sons with Disabilities, which is functioning in the Regional Employment Exchange, U.T., Chandigarh. 465 disabled applicants are awaiting employment on the Live Register as on 31.03.2015.

Schemes for Ensuring Employment of Persons with Disabilities (Section 38)

☐ Chandigarh Child & Women Development Corporation has been declared as channelising agency of National Handicapped Finance & Development Corporation. This Corporation is providing loans to physically handicapped persons for self-employment. During the year, 26 PwDs provided loans for self-employment. During the year 2014-15, loan sanctioned to 02 beneficiaries, sanctioned amount was Rs 35,000/- per beneficiary.

Reservation in Government Educational Institutions (Section 39)

3% seats have been reserved for persons with disabilities in educational institutions and Government Aided Institutions. Department of Personnel has issued instructions to all educational/technical institutions to ensure that no deserving disabled student is left out from getting admission.

Reservation in Poverty Alleviation Programmes (Section 40)

☐ Instructions have been issued to all Heads of Departments/offices/Board and Corporation to give 3% reservation to physically handicapped persons in poverty alleviations programmes.

4.6.6 Affirmative Action (Section 42-43): Aids and appliances to Persons with Disabilities (Section 42)

Financial Assistance for purchase of Aids and Appliances like tricycle, wheel chair, hearing aid, goggles, folding sticks, crutches and clippers, artificial limb etc. is being given by the Department of Social Welfare. The quantum of assistance is 100%, if the concerned person belongs to a family income upto Rs. 8000/- p.m. During 2014-15, total 25 persons availed financial assistance under the scheme.

2,824 persons with disabilities are getting pension up to 31.3.2015 @ Rs.500/-P.M.

Preferential Allotment of Land (Section 43)

□ Chandigarh Administration has notified a scheme for the preferential allotment of land to persons with disabilities at concessional rates for setting up STD booths, juice bar etc. Chandigarh Administration have issued a notification No.3370-UTFl (3)-2009/1266 dated 2.3.2009 notifying a scheme called the "Licensing of bare booth Sites/Built up Booths to the Persons with Disabilities Scheme, 2009". The Estate Office, UT of Chandigarh has allotted booths to the 42 eligible persons with disabilities.

4.6.7 Non-Discrimination in Transport (Section 44)

□ Chandigarh Transport Undertaking buses have been modified by reducing the height of stairs to facilitate easy entry and exit from the bus. Free travel concession in CTU buses is extended to disabled persons. Modifierd toilets have been provided at ISBT's Sector-17 & Sector-43 in UT.

4.6.8 Barrier-Free Environment on Road and Public Buildings (Section 45-46)

□ New Public Buildings are being designed and provisions are made for ramps and lifts to provide an easy access to all levels/floors and provision of toilet for handicapped persons is being made mandatory on ground floor level. □ While sanctioning the buildings plans of private public building, it has been made mandatory to provide access for ground floor level through easily accessible ramp and provision of handicapped toilet as per norms at ground floor level for wheel chair users.

4.6.9 Non Discrimination in Govt. Employment (Section 47)

☐ For the implementation of Section 47 of the Act instructions have issued by the Department of Personnel to Heads of all Departments.

☐ The Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities appointed with an additional charge.

☐ State Resource Centre-cum-District Rehabilitation Centre has been established in Government Medical College & Hospital, Sector-32, Chandigarh. The other coordinating agencies of this centre are: Rehabilitation Centre for Handicapped Children, Sector-38, Chandigarh (PRAYASS), Institution for the Care of Blind Government Institute for Mentally Retarded Children, Sector-32, Chandigarh.

- ☐ Examination system has been modified to eliminate mathematical question for the benefit of blind/low vision students.
- ☐ Free transport facilities available for 1930 CwDs studying at primary and secondary level and for 160 CwDs atudying at higher level.

4.10.3 Prevention & Survey (Section 25):

- □ Department of Women and Child Development have undertaken survey for early detection of disability in the month of August-September, 2014. As per this survey, the number of children in the age-group 0-6 years are 1175387. Out of these, 11390 children were disabled. Regular growth monitoring and weighing of children are done to ascertain their health status.
- ☐ Under ICDS, following methods are used to prevent disabilities:
 - Immunization
 - Health Check-up
 - Growth promotion and supplementary feeding
 - Referral Services
 - Early Childhood and pre-school education
 - Nutrition and Health Education
- ☐ Pregnant women registered at Aanganwadi centers are given supplementary nutrition in Aanganwadi centers & referred to nearest health facility for immunization, iron & folic acid supplementation. SABLA scheme implemented in East, North-East and North-West districts in Delhi in this regard.
- ☐ Training for early detection & care for children with special needs is already being given in the field on pilot basis in West Delhi ICDS Project's of Nawada & Uttam Nagar. Aanganwadi workers from 25 Aanganwadi centers trained regarding identification, early detection and referral services to be given to such children with special needs.

- ☐ Ante-natal clinic running in the hospitals for proper advice and check-ups to reduce incidence of any disability in their fetus. Orthopedic disabilities are detected and treated in Orthopedic Deptt. Cataract screening is done in Eye OPD and examination is done in ENT OPD, Pulse Polio Immunization programme is organized by Deptt of Health and Family Welfare, Vitamin A supplement is being provided to children less than five years and immunization for disease like T.B., Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Tetanus, Polio, Hepatitis etc are being provided to all children to prevent disabilities.
- ☐ Regular Nutrition, Health and Hygiene education is imparted in Aanganwadi Centers by the Aanaganwadi workers and by involving various community resource persons. Mother's meeting held where the importance of hygiene and sanitation is discussed. Adolescent girls are also given awareness on health, hygiene and sanitation in SABLA sessions and Kishori Samooh. ECCE day is celebrated in Aanganwadi Centers every month where parents, community resource persons, children are involved to spread awareness regarding overall development of children.
- ☐ For prevention and early detection, there is a mechanism of teaching of student nurses about the causes of congenital anomalies and preventive measures. Awareness campaign is being carried for doctors, nurses, para-medical staff and public through interactive sessions from time to time.

- ☐ For pre-natal, para-natal and post-natal care of mother and child, there is Immunization programme for pregnant women and children through the Govt. hospitals. Regular check-up of newborn babies for hearing is being done by otoecoustic emission examination to detect hearing loss in the early stage. Conducting regular antenatal ultrasound, colour doppler to detect congenital anomalies and prevent birth of diagnosed child. Ante-natal screening of children at the time of birth 129072 children screened at the time of birth. 6,475 women were provided incentive for institutional delivery under JSY. Pregnant women screened for congenital anomalies, ultrasound, and other necessary tests done free of cost.
- **4.10.4** Education (Section 26-31):
 - ☐ Total number of children with disabilities upto 18 years in State is 38,188.
 - ☐ Table 4.9 shows the Number of CwDs upto 18 years of age studying in schools.
 - ☐ Free education for children with disabilities is available in the State. Necessary instructions have been issued not to deny admission to CwDs in normal Schools.
 - ☐ 13 Govt. and 13 Govt. aided Special Schools in five districts are running.

- ☐ Both disabled and non-disabled children are studying in 2,680 schools.
- ☐ 7853 CwDs studying in class IX-XII in the schools under Deptt. of Education are receiving scholarships @ Rs.600/- per annum.
- □ 1053 schools under Directorate of Education, GNCT of Delhi have made their building accessible to PwDs. 207 Colleges are architecturally barrier free.

- ☐ Facilities for placement of CwDs are being promoted.
- ☐ Flexibility of curriculum for children with disabilities entrusted to SCERT. The SCERT conducts Elementary Teacher Training Curriculum that has been restricted taking care of the concept of Inclusive Education, to enable the general teacher to understand and appreciate the needs and abilities of the disabled child. The curriculum aims at developing positive attitude towards disabled children society by involving family, community and neighbourhood, helping understand and fight prejudice.
- ☐ Instructions have been issued to provide/ use the services of scribe/writer to blind/ low vision CwDs.
- ☐ Transport facilities with nominal fees of Rs 40/- per child is provided to students studying in special school for hearing impaired run by Govt of Delhi.
- □ 20 minutes extra time per hour in written examinations is allowed to CwDs in schools. One hour extra time is given to students with disabilities in special schools run by Govt of Delhi.

5

Redressal of Grievances

- 5.1.1 Under Sections 58 and 59 of the Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) Act, 1995, the Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities (CCPD) is mandated to take steps to safeguard the rights and facilities made available to persons with disabilities and to redress their grievances related to the deprivation of their rights and non implementation of laws, rules bye-laws etc. made by the appropriate Government for their welfare.
- 5.1.2 The office of CCPD receives complaints that relates to a range of issues like nonimplementation or wrong implementation of reservation in employment/education, unfair selection, promotion, transfers, denial of service benefits and other service related matters; denial of admission, improper infrastructure and facilities for education, writing of examinations, harassment, Civil/Criminal disputes, accessibility related issues, denial of banking facilities, preferential allotment of land, petrol pumps, gas agencies, etc. A large number of organizations and persons with disabilities also sought clarifications on various issues related to disability. In case of violation of any provision of the Persons
- with Disabilities Act, 1995, or of any law, rules and regulations etc. made for the benefit of persons with disabilities, the Office takes up the matter with the concerned authorities and resolves it either through conciliation/advice or quasi judicial proceedings that are concluded by passing orders with appropriate direction/advice to the concerned authorities.
- 5.1.3 The office has developed a comprehensive format of notice to show cause, which gives brief facts of the complaint, the position of law, the violation committed and also the course of remedial action by the respondent Organizations. This has helped in exercising the quasi-judicial powers vested with the CCPD for redressal of grievances relating to the rights of persons with disabilities. The CCPD also on his own initiative registers complaints/cases against establishments, whose actions are in violation of statutory provisions and administrative arrangements meant for persons with disabilities.
- **5.1.4** Interventions of the office of CCPD have resulted in increased awareness and understanding about various provisions of

the law, the responsibilities of the establishments, attitudinal and behavioral changes towards PwDs and about the mechanism for grievance redressal. The observations and directions of the CCPD have also been instrumental in bringing about major changes in policies viz. The National Insurance Company Limited has amended its guidelines for providing scribe to candidates with disabilities (VH), KVPY has decided to include empowerment initiative for persons with disabilities from 2013 onwards, Kendriya Vidhyalaya Sanghthan amended its admission guidelines, Department of Personnel & Training has amended the format of disability certificate, Ministry of Health & Family Welfare amended the definition of family by including the dependent disabled brother in the definition of family without any age limit.

- 5.1.5 Office of the CCPD since its inception in October 1998 till 31.03.2015 took up 18689 matters (excluding matters taken up in Mobile Courts) either on its own initiative or on the basis of complaints/representations received in the office. In the year 2014-15, 2196 cases were registered as new cases. In addition to the fresh cases registered during 2014-15, 1205 (including 02 matters of mobile courts) pending matters from previous years were also carried forward for taking appropriate action.
- **5.1.6** As compared to the year 2013-14, the number of cases registered in the office of

- the CCPD has increased in the year 2014-15 by 80.59%.
- 5.1.7 Total 1873 cases were disposed as against 1157 during 2013-14 i.e. an increase of disposal by 61.88%. 1528 (including 03 matters of mobile courts) cases were under process as on 31st March 2015.
- **5.1.8** Year-wise number of cases registered and disposed by the O/o of the Chief Commissioner since its inception is given in Table 5.1.
 - 5.2 A Brief on the major complaints received/disposed off during 2014-15 are as follows:
- 5.2.1 Matters related to Education/Conduct of Examination
 - i) Case No. 870/1041/2014

Shri Sandeep Kumar, Welfare Officer, O/o Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities, Govt. of NCT of Delhi vide letter dated 24.01.2014 has forwarded a copy of the representation dated 11.01.2013 of Ms. Pooja Sahai regarding non-implementation of the guidelines for conducting written examination for persons with disabilities by the Staff Selection Commission(SSC) while conducting examination of Combined Higher Secondary Level on 10.11.2013 and not to repeat such instance in the ensuing examination to be conducted by SCERT. The matter was taken up with the Chairman, State Council of Educational Research and Training (SCERT), DOP&T and SSC

vide this court letter dated 05.03.2014. Director, SCERT vide letter no. F.(2)/SCERT/Exam/2010/2133-34 dated 18.06.2014 informed that SCERT has implemented the guidelines after approved by Secretary Education-cum-Chairperson, SCERT and circulated vide letter no. F.8 (1)/Exam. Cell/ SCERT/ 2010/175-220 dated

07.05.2014 to all DIETs and Pvt. Recognized institutes affiliated to SCERT.

ii) Case No. 2407/1041/2014

Ms. Kruti Beesam, a person with 70% cerebal palsy filed a complaint dated 17.07.2014 regarding facility of scribe in Civil Services Examination. She has submitted that her

hands and legs are affected with cerebal palsy. Though she can write with right hand but the pace is slow and she cannot mark perfectly in OMR sheet even upon getting the extra time. She had made written request to Secretary, UPSC and the Under Secretary, UPSC on 30.06.2014 & 14.07.2014 respectively but of no avail. The matter was taken up with the Secretary, UPSC vide letter dated 06.08.2014 directing that the request of Ms. Kruti Beesam may be considered in the light of guidelines issued by Deptt. of Disability Affairs. Under Secretary, UPSC vide letter no. 1.1(23)/2014-Exam XXI dated 21.08.2014 informed that the Commission has allowed Ms. Kruti Beesam to avail the assistance of the scribe and also compensatory time for Civil Services Examination. Ms. Kruti Beesam also vide her e-mail dated 01.09.2014 thanked this court for taking up the matter with UPSC which enabled her to write the exam with the help of a scribe with extra time.

5.2.2 Scholarship to the students with disabilities:

Case No. 872/1033/2014

Shri Vivek Singh, a person with disability filed a representation dated 02.01.2014 regarding non-disbursement of money by Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment to the students with disabilities under RGNF Scholarship Scheme. The matter was forwarded to the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Department of Disability Affairs for taking nec-

essary action vide this court's letter dated 12.08.2014.

Under Secretary, DD IV, Department of Disability Affairs, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment vide letter no. 22-09/2010-DD-III dated 26.08.2014 informed that the matter has been looked into in consultation with the Canara Bank who is designated to disburse the fellowship amount to the beneficiary. Shri Vivek Singh has been paid Rs. 5.06 lakh so far in respect of the RGNF fellowship.

5.2.3 Matters related to Employment

i) Case No. 561/1011/10-11

Dr. Deepak Singh, a person with 55% locomotor disability filed a complaint dated 24.01.2011 against the Coal India Limited before the Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities under the Persons with Disabilities (Equal Opportunities, Protection of Rights and Full Participation) Act, 1995, hereinafter referred to as the Act regarding violation of Section 33 of the Persons with Disabilities Act, 1995. The matter was heard on 11.04.2012 and vide Record of Proceedings dated 07.05.2012 the appointing authority in Coal India Limited was advised to re-examine the matter in the light of the provision of para 22 of DOP&T's OM dated 29.12.2005 and consider appointment of the complainant against one of the 10 vacancies reserved for persons with disabilities so as to fill up as many vacancies for persons with disabilities as possible. As nothing has been heard from either of the

parties, the General Manager (Pers./Rectt.), Coal India Limited was requested vide this court's letter dated 19.05.2014 to intimate the present position of the matter to this court. Coal India Limited in response to this court's letter dated 19.05.2014 has informed that Dr. Deepak Singh has been appointed in Coal India Limited as Senior Medical Officer in E3 grade and posted at Central Coalfields Limited.

ii) Case No. 966/1011/13-14

Shri Subhash Chandra Vashishth, Advocate filed a complaint vide his e-mail dated 04.04.2013 under the Persons with Disabilities (Equal Opportunities, Protection of Rights and Full Participation) Act, 1995 regarding provision of 1% reservation only to persons with orthopedically handicapped instead of 3% reservation to persons with disabilities in Kerala Judicial Service. He submitted that Hon'lble High Court of Kerala published a notification no. REC4-5384/2013 dated 21.03.2013 inviting applications for filling up of 74 posts of Munsiff- Magistrates in Kerala Judicial Service. Out of 74 posts, only 1% reservation was provided to persons with orthopedically handicapped persons. He also alleged that the impugned notification restricted the visually impaired candidates to apply for the said post. The matter was taken up with the Registrar, High Court of Kerala vide this court's show cause notice dated 16.04.2013. After various correspondence, the case was 15.10.2013, hearings on fixed 21.11.2013, 23.01.2014 & 23.06.2014. The

matter was disposed of vide this court's order dated 21.07.2014 stating that it is the prerogative of the appropriate Government within the ambit of Section 32 of the Act to take a decision and that the matter will be considered by the full bench of the Hon'ble Kerala High Court on 24.06.2014 and the G.O will be issued by the Government of Kerala as intimated by the Additional Chief Secretary, Govt. of Kerala vide his letter dated 20.06.2014 thereby allowing low vision candidates for the said post.

iii) Case No. 1140/1011/2014

Shri Subhash Chandra Vashishth has filed a complaint dated 13.03.2014 on behalf of Shri Akhilesh Kumar Dahiya, a person with blindness against the action of Institute of Banking Personnel Selection thereby restraining the affected person for appearance in interview for the post of Law Officer on the ground of non-identification of post for visually impaired candidates. The matter was taken up with the IBPS vide this Court's letter dated heard on 14.03.2104. IBPS vide its letter dated 27.05.2014 has informed that they have called all the three candidates with disabilities for the interview and selected the affected person in the instant case namely Shri Dahiya in Allahabad Bank.

5.2.4 Service Matters

i) Case No. 2104/1014/2014

Ms. Kavita Saini , a person with blindness, filed a complaint dated 12.06.2014 regarding her candidature for the post of Probationary Officer in JMGS-I in Canara Bank. The matter was taken up with the Canara Bank vide this court's letter dated 13.06.2014. Canara Bank vide its letter dated 24.06.2014 submitted that they have cleared the candidature of Ms. Kavita Saini for the post of Probationary Officer.

ii) Case No. 1035/1014/2013

Mr. Manjeet Rao, a person with blindness, filed a complaint dated 12.02.2014 regarding Group D recruitment in Northern Railway. The matter was taken up with the Chairman, Railway Recruitment Cell, Northern Railway vide this court's letter dated 10.7.2014. Mechanical Workshop, Northern Railway vide its letter number 220/E/97/EI/Helper/2013/Pt-XIX dated 22.07.2014 informed that they have already sent the case of the complainant to CWM/NR/Amritsar for his joining which has been confirmed by the complainant vide his letter dated 04.09.2014.

iii) Case No. 137/1021/10-11

Shri Udai Raj Singh, a person with hearing impairment, filed a complaint dated 27.07.2010 regarding his promotion to the post of Assistant in Ordnance Clothing Factory, Ministry of Defence, Shahjahanpur, UP. The matter was taken up with the respondent 13.09.2010 followed by various hearings on 09.02.2011, 06.09.2011, 09.04.2014 and orders were issued on 17.04.2014. In compliance to the orders of this Court, as communicated by the respondent vide letter No. Estt/431/DPC dated 09.07.2014, the review DPC was

conducted and as per recommendations, the complainant along with other 2 persons with disabilities who have approached this Court on earlier occasions have been promoted to the post of Assistant from 17.02.2005 against PwD Quota.

iv) Case No. 1281/1022/2014

Smt. Lamboi Kipgen wife of Shri Haojakhup Kipgen vide her e-mail dated 21.04.2014 has submitted that they hail from Manipur State. Her husband is working in the State Bank of Hyderabad as Chief Manager at Anaparthy in East Godavari District of Andhra Pradesh. Their daughter named Ms. Florina Kimmonnei Kipgen who was diagnosed as Autistic, studying and rehabilitated at Kolkata. Since there were no facilities for her at his husband's place of posting at Anaparthy, which is a village, he had to retain her, elder son and their autistic daughter at Kolkata for their daughter sake. He had to frequently visit them as a father meeting, interactions related to their daughter at her school with therapist, doctors, psychologist etc., causing lots of stress and tension physically, emotionally and financially. His separation from them, especially their daughter often caused unexplained behavioral problems. The matter was taken up with the Managing Director, State Bank of Hyderabad vide this court's letter dated 25.04.2014. The Deputy General Manager (HR), State Bank of Hyderabad vide letter no. PER/GR.I/19 dated 24.05.2014 has informed that Shri Haoja Khup, complainant's husband on his elevation to the present grade was posted to Georai branch recently. The official has neither requested his choice of posting nor informed about the illness of his daughter. However, taking into consideration the health status of his daughter, Shri Haoja Khup has been posted to their Park Street Branch, Kolkata by modifying his earlier order from Georai as requested by him.

v) Case No. 2017/1022/2014

Shri Mukesh Kumar, a person with hearing impairment filed a complaint dated 08.05.2014 regarding his transfer to his native place. He submitted that he is working as Principal at Kendriya Vidyalaya, Godda, Iharkhand. He requested for his transfer on the basis of DoP&T's OM dated 10.05.1990 & 13.03.2002 but KVS has not transferred him yet. At Godda, Jharkhand no ENT specialist is available presently and his hearing capacity is slowing down day by day. He has requested for his transfer to his native place. The matter was taken up with the Commissioner, Kendirya Vidyalaya Sangathan vide this office letter dated 18.06.2014 advising them to consider the complainant's request in the light of DoP&T's OM dated 10.05.1990, 13.03.2002 and latest instructions dated 31.03.2014. Asstt. Commissioner (Admn.) (Estt.-1), KVS vide letter no. 11044/41-6-16/ PPL/2012/-KVS (Estt-I0/4932 30.07.2014 has informed that Shri Mukesh Kumar, Principal has been transferred from KV, Godda (Jharkhand) to KV, Karauli, Rajasthan on his own request vide

their office order dated 25.07.2014.

vi) Case No. 1173/1022/2014

Shri Jiban Kumar Saha father of Master Sayandip Saha a child with autistic filed a representation dated 18.03.2014 regarding his retention at West Bengal Telecom Circle with posting at Kolkata. He submitted that his only child Master Sayandip Saha aged 16 years has been diagnosed as a Autistic child with Pervasive Developmental Disorder by the National Institute of Mental Health and Neuro Science, Bangalore. During the year 2012, the complainant had been transferred to NE - II Telecom Circle by BSNL Corporate Office and his wife Smt. Ruby Saha, Sr. Accounts Officer, Eastern Telecom Circle has been transferred to Assam Telecom Circle in the same order. The complainant submitted that while remaining posted in Kolkata he can look after the special education needs of his autistic son in Special School in Kolkata imparting in his mother tongue. The matter was taken up with the Chairman cum Managing Director, BSNL vide this court's letter dated 29.05.2014. Shri Jiban Kumar Saha vide his letter dated 06.08.2014 has intimated that on intervention of this Court, Bharat Sanchar Nigam Limited has considered his case sympathetically and retained him in West Bengal Telecom Circle as AO vide order dated 11.07.2014.

vii) Case No. 2445/1022/2014

Ms. Manjula Patankar, Director, Roshni Ramakrishna Ashram vide her e-mail dat-

ed 18.07.2014 has forwarded a complaint of Shri Pramod Trivedi, father of Master Pulkit Trivedi, a child suffering from severe autism, who was posted as SDE at BSNL, Gwalior. Shri Pramod Trivedi was transferred to BSNL Manendragarh, Chhattisgarh. Shri Trivedi's son is undergoing treatment at Roshni Ramakrishna Ashram for regular intensive special programme for infants with autism since September, 2013. The complainant wishes to go back to Gwalior to look after his family and ailing child. The matter was taken up by this Court vide letter dated 26.08.2013 with the CMD, BSNL. The Asst. General Manager (Pers II) vide O.N. No. 1-7/2014-Pers.II dated 15.09.2014 conveyed to this court that BSNL has decided to transfer Shri Pramod Trivedi from Chhattisgarh to M.P. Circle. Ms. Manjula Patankar vide her letter dated 25.10.2014 thanked this Court for intervening in getting transfer of Shri Trived from Chattisgarh Circle to M.P. Circle.

viii) Case No. 2118/1022/2014

Ms. Aparana Mahajan, a person with 40% locomotor disability filed a complaint dated 02.06.2014 regarding her transfer to Hoshangabad. The matter was taken up with the Chairman & Managing Director, BSNL vide this court's letter dated 15.07.2014 followed by a reminder dated 18.09.2014. The Chief Liasion officer (SCT), BSNL, Corporate Office vide letter no. 25-05/2013-SCT-SG/770 dated 29.09.2014 has intimated that CGMT, MP Telecom Circle has informed that the

transfer order of Ms. Aparana Mahajan has been kept in abeyance.

ix) Case No. 2257/1024/2014 (Transport Allowance)

Shri Devinder Kumar, a person with 80% disability, filed a complaint dated 17.05.2014 regarding non-payment of Transport Allowance at double the normal rate by Kendriya Vidyalaya Sangthan(KVS). The matter was taken up with the KVS vide this court's letter dated 04.07.2014. KVS vide its order No. 32029/ Admn/2014/KVS/GGN/3453-54 dated 16/17.06.2014 sanctioned Transport Allowance double the normal rates retrospectively w.e.f 01.12.2008.

x) Case No. 404/1024/2013

Shri Satvir Ninania, a person with 50% locomotor disabilities, filed a complaint dated 30.08.2013 regarding some relaxations from KVS, Delhi regarding invigilation duties, short break between 2-3 periods and Western Style toilets. The matter was taken up with the KVS vide this office letter dated 19.03.2014. KVS Delhi vide its letter dated 02.06.2014 has taken required actions as requested by the complainant and redressal of grievances.

xi) Case No. 2623/1024/2014

Shri Narayan Dutt, a person with 40% locomotor disabilities, filed a complaint dated 19.08.2014 regarding grant of Special Casual Leave in the office of the PCDA(WC), Ministry of Defence. The matter was taken up with the KVS vide

this office letter number dated 20.11.2014. PCDA(WC), Chandigarh vide its letter dated 04.12.2014 has taken required decision to grant Special Casual Leave for four days in all such cases as and when applied by employees with such disabilities.

xii) Case No. 2623/1024/2014

Shri S.K.Vadiraj, a person with 60% locomotor disabilities, filed a complaint on 20.08.2013 regarding providing him with an alternative employment and protection of his salary and allowances by the Department of Atomic Energy, Mumbai. The complainant submitted that he was appointed as Driver Grade-1 on 06.10.1988 at RC BRIT, Bangalore. On 10.06.1995, while he was traveling to his friend's house in Bangalore, he met with an accident and his right arm was amputated. He reported for duty after availing 110 days for his treatment. The then Chief Executive created a post and reappointed him as Helper 'B' at Bangalore office. Therefore, he was once again put on probation for a period of one year. His salary as Driver Grade I was protected till August, 1998. At the time of reappointment, his pay band was brought down to that of Helper A/T which resulted in reduction of basic salary. The difference in his salary was recovered in subsequent months. He brought this to the notice of concerned officials, but went in vain. The complainant had also approached the State Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities, Government of Karnataka on 30.06.2012 with his grievance of harassment. The State Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities took the matter with the Chief Execudated BRIT/DAE vide letter PDA:SEC62:01:2012-13/479 dated 07.08.2012. During that time, he learnt about the provision of Section 47 of the Act. But after several follow ups through letters and his personal visit to Mumbai office, he was given to understand after a gap of nearly one year that the matter has been closed by their Office vide letter no. BRIT/General/2012/836 dated 15.09.2012 written to the State Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities, Government of Karnataka stating therein that the complainant has been provided not only with alternative employment but his salary and allowances at par with what he drew earlier as Driver Grade I were also protected. The matter was taken up with the respondent vide this Court's letter dated 29.10.2013 followed by hearings on 30.04.2014 and 07.08.2014. After perusal of the records and all provisions in this regard an order was passed on 18.09.2014 observing that the impugned action of the respondent occurred after the commencement of this Act and this gives reasons enough to this Court to direct the respondent to appropriately adjust the complainant in accordance with the provisions of Section 47(1) of the Act so as to ensure that he is neither reduced in rank nor for that matter in pay scale/service benefits/other service benefits w.e.f. 06.02.1996. All consequential benefits should be made available to him w.e.f. 06.02.1996. The respondent vide its letter

dated 27.03.2015 communicated that the orders of this Court have been compiled with and the complainant appointed as T/A (CM) w.e.f 06.02.1996 with all consequential benefits in accordance with the provisions of Section 47 of the PwD Act.

xiii) Case No. 1296/1022/2014

Shri M.Umapathy father of Master M. Sidharth, a person with hearing impairment, filed a complaint dated 15.04.2014 regarding his posting at Mysore by BSNL. The matter was taken up with the BSNL Delhi vide this court's letter dated 28.04.2014 followed by reminder dated 17.11.2014. BSNL vide its order No. 8(5)/CEE/KEZ/BGL/1225 dated 12.12. 2014 transferred the complaint to Mysore (KTK).

xiv) Case No. 696/1022/2013

Shri Pawan Kumar, a person with 55% locomotor disabilities, filed a complaint dated 13.11.2013 regarding his posting order for transfer at Khajuwala, Rajasthan by Doordarshan. The matter was taken up with the DG, Doordarshan, vide this court's letter dated 10.02.2014. DG, Doordarshan vide its order No. 09/08/2014 dated 04/2014 transferred the complaint to Gorakhpur and the complainant has joined the new post.

5.2.5 Miscellaneous & Other Grievances

i) Disability Certificate (Case No. 2094/1121/2014)

Shri Anil Bharat Kapur, a person with disability vide his e-mail dated 07.06.2014 has submitted that he hold a certificate of 47%

disability issued by Orthopaedic Deptt.., Hedgewar Hospital, Delhi for his defective Spine Surgery. To obtain a Multiple Disability Certificate, he applied at Safdarjung Hospital. In-spite of attending two Medical Boards the certificate has not been issued to him. The matter was taken up with the Medical Superintendent, Safdarjung Hospital vide this court's letter dated 25.06.2014. CMO (MRD & TC) vide letter no. 2-20/14-MR (MDB) dated 08.07.2014 has informed that certificate was received in their Department from Urology Department on 12.06.2014 and was issued on 13.06.2014 to the person concerned.

ii) Inclusion of the name of MR son in the P.P.O for lifetime family pension (Case No. 43/1121/12-13)

Shri P.M.K Rao, filed a complaint dated 24.04.2012 regarding inclusion of the name of his son with mental retardation in the P.P.O for lifetime family pension. He submitted that he retired from Railways in 2002. His son Shri P. Srinivas is a person with mental retardation. Though as per the disability certificates dated 10.06.2002 and 04.11.2005 issued by East Coast Railways, he cannot earn his livelihood. The matter was taken up with the CMS & Chairman, Medical Board, East Coast Railway vide letter dated 26.06.2012. Considering the complainant's rejoinder dated 14.07.2012 a hearing in the matter was fixed on 13.09.2012. After the hearings in the matter on 13.09.2012, 05.11.2012 & 10.09.2013, the respondent was directed to bring out appropriate modifications in

the relevant formats and practices. Divisional Personnel Officer, East Coast Railway vide letter no. WPE/22/WHH/14C/7157 dated 28.05.2014 informed that the name of the mentally retarded son of Shri P.M.K Rao has been incorporated in his P.P.O and the FA & CAO (Pension), East Coast Railway, Bhubaneswar issued a revised PPO No. 347/2002 having such incorporation.

iii) Denial of ATM Card(Case No. 1262&1280/1102/2014)

Shri George Abraham, CEO, Score Foundation vide his e-mail dated 21.04.2014 has informed that Shri Sanjay Kumar and Shri Rahul Kumar Mandal, persons with visual impairment are the customers of State Bank of India, in the State of Jharkhand, Siwandih City branch. He was denied facility of ATM card, although he has given the circulars of RBI and IBA to the branch manager who refused to issue ATM card and asked him to produce one witness whenever he has to withdraw money from bank. The matter was taken up with the Chairman & Managing Director, State Bank of India vide this court's letter dated 23.04.2014. The General Manager (NBG - Coordination), State Bank of India vide letter no. NBCS/RJT/14-15/778 dated 23.05.2014 has informed that their Siwandih branch has also arranged for ATM card to Shri Sanjay Kumar. Shri Sanjay Kumar vide his letter dated 10.05.2014 submitted to Branch Manager, Siwandih has shown his satisfaction and has withdrawn his complaint. Shri Rahul Kumar Mandal vide his letter dated 30.04.2014 has stated about the receipt of ATM PIN and resolution of the complaint.

iv) Accessible facilities

(Case Number: 2301/1023/2014)

Shri V.Shyam, a person with 60% locomotor disabilities, filed a complaint dated 30.06.2014 regarding mental harassment by BSNL Mysore, SSA management by not providing proper infrastructure and also treat his break period from 04.10.2013 to 14.02.2014 as commuted leave and payment of his salary. The matter was taken up with the BSNL vide this office letter number dated 14.07.2014. BSNL vide its letter no. 14-09/2013-SEA-BSNL(Part) dated 09.09.2014 redressed the grievances of the complainant which was further confirmed by the complainant vide his letter dated 27.11.2014.

(Case Number: 2425/1101/2014)

Shri S.Muralidharan, a person with 60% locomotor disabilities, filed a complaint dated 21.07.2014 regarding non provision of Ramps and Handrails at Kalpakkam ATM of State Bank of India. The matter was taken up with the SBI, Zonal Office at Chennai vide this office letter number dated 23.01.2015. SBI, Chennai vide its letter no. LHO/ATM/2014-15/324 dated 19.02.2015 redressed the grievances of the complainant and confirmed that the Ramp & Railings work at Kalpakkam ATM was completed on 08.02.2015.

Monitoring of Utilisation of Funds

- 6.1 One of the important functions of the CCPD under Section 58(b) of the Act is to monitor utilization of funds disbursed by the Central Government for the benefit of PwDs. Besides Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, other Central Ministries such as Ministry of Human Resource Development, Ministry of Rural Development, Ministry of Rural Development, Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, Ministry of Housing and Urban Poverty Alleviation (MH&UPA), etc. also have substantial component for PwDs in their respective budgets. The amount involved is huge and running into thousands of crores.
- 6.2 During 2014-15, the Monitoring Team constituted by the office of CCD inspected the beneficiaries of five organization in Etawah & Mainpuri, Barabanki & Unnao, Varanasi & Mirzapur (UP), Jehanabad (Bihar), Ujjain & Indore (MP), Mumbai & Pune (Maharashtra) which received grant in aid from Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Government of India under DDRS/ADIP Schemes. The Monitoring Team carried out sample check of the beneficiaries of the scheme and the school, which received grant under DDRS/ADIP. Detailed report alongwith the observations of the monitoring team were forwarded to M/o Social Justice & Empowerment for further necessary action.

Recommendations

- **2.** All State Governments/UTs may ensure to convene regular meetings of State Coordination Committee and State Executive Committees as per the provisions envisaged under Section 13 and 19 of the PwD Act, 1995 respectively.
 - **2.** Action plan should be prepared for issuance of disability certificates to all persons with disabilities in a time bound manner by each State and UT Administration. State Governments/ UT should form mobile unit of Doctors to cover all the PwDs in remote areas and ensure that disability certificates are issued to them thorugh door-to-door survey in campaign mode.
 - **3.** Free coaching facility for competitive examinations may be arranged for persons with disabilities on the same way as is done in the case of SCs/STs by the concerned State Governments /UTs.
 - **4.** A toll free number/helpline should be provided by the Central Government, State Governments/UTs in their respective department for providing hassle free counselling/facilitation/

grievance rederessal for persons with disabilities on disabilities related issues.

- powerment of Persons with Disabilities may revisit the identification of posts. Broad Category of disability like "Both Arms affected" (BA) or "Both Legs affected" (BL) should be further divided into smaller sub-categories. A person having both the arms amputed and another person having both the arms of weak muscle or of short reach are kept in the same group. But the extent of their disability and capacity is very different. As a result, they are found equally not suitable for a particular post.
- **6.** All Ministries/Departments of the Central Government and State/UT Government shall endorse a copy of notifications/instructions/policies/schemes meant for the welfare of persons with disabilities invariably to the Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities and the concerned department in their State/UT dealing with the matters of persons with disabilities.

A. National Handicapped Finance And Development Corporation

The National Handicapped Finance and Development Corporation (NHFDC) has been set up by the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Government of India on 24th January 1997. The company is registered under Section 25 of the Companies Act, 1956 as a Company not for profit. It is wholly owned by Government of India and has an authorized share capital of Rs. 400 Crores (Rupees Four Hundred Crore only). The company is managed by Board of Directors nominated by Government of India.

1. Aims & Objectives

- ☐ Promote economic development activities and self-employment ventures for the benefit of persons with disabilities.
- Extend loan to the persons with disabilities for upgradation of their entrepreneurial skills for proper and efficient management of self-employment ventures.
- ☐ Extend loans to persons with disability for pursuing professional/technical education leading to vocational rehabilitation/self employment.
- ☐ To assist self-employed individuals

with disability in marketing their finished goods.

2. Eligibility

Any disabled person who fulfills following criteria is eligible for availing credit –

- a) Any Indian Citizen with 40% or more disability.
- b) Age between 18 and 60 years.
- c) Annual income below Rs.5,00,000/- per annum for urban areas and Rs.3,00,000/- per annum for rural areas.
- d) Relevant educational/ technical/ vocational qualification/ experience and background.

8. Procedure for obtaining loan

Applications on prescribed format to be submitted through the **State Channelising Agencies of NHFDC**. Projects upto Rs. 1.00 lakh are sanctioned by State Channelising Agencies and applications for loan more than Rs. 1.00 lakh is sanctioned by NHFDC.

Schemes for Parents' Association of mentally retarded persons

Purpose

Purpose of the scheme is to provide loan to parents associations of mentally retarded persons to set up an income generating activity for the benefit of the mentally retarded persons. The nature of in-

come generating activity will be such that it involves the mentally retarded persons directly and income will be distributed among the mentally retarded persons. The income generating activity will be managed by the parents association, which is expected to render its services voluntarily.

Eligibility

- a) The parents association should be registered for at least 3 years.
- b) It should have a minimum membership of 10 parents.
- c) It should not be a financial defaulter of Central Government, State Government, any financial institution in the public sector, banks etc.

Quantum of Loan

Quantum of loan to each NGO is limited to Rs. 5.00 lakh. The share of the NGO will be 5% of the project cost. The loan will be used by the NGO to implement a single or multiple activity projects in which the maximum possible participation of the beneficiaries may be ensured.

Rate of Interest

The interest on the loan amount will be charged as per following table-

- i) Upto Rs. 50,000/--5% p.a.
- ii) Above Rs. 50,000/- and less than Rs. 5.00 lakh. 6% p.a.

Repayment Period

The loan amount including interest will be repaid within 10 years in equal quarterly installments.

Insurance Cover

Adequate insurance cover may be obtained in

respect of assets acquired by the NGO out of the loan advanced by National Handicapped Finance and Development Corporation. The premium of insurance will be paid by the NGO.

Management of the Project

The income generating activity for which loan is advanced by NHFDC will be managed by such office bearers of the parents association who are parents of mentally retarded children. It will hold at least one meeting in a quarter to review the implementation and progress of the project. A representative of NHFDC will also be attending such meeting to review the implementation of the project.

Procedure for Obtaining Loan

The loan application under the scheme will be submitted to National Handicapped Finance and Development Corporation directly by the NGO. However, the NGO should get a resolution passed by its Managing Committee/Board of Trustee to this effect. Proof of this should be submitted alongwith the application.


